The original company, Pilobolus Dance Theater, has been touring its 115 pieces of repertory to more than 64 countries during the past four decades. Named after a barnyard fungus that propels its spores with extraordinary speed, accuracy and strength, Pilobolus was founded in 1971 by a group of Dartmouth College students and quickly became renowned the world over for its witty and gravity-defying works using the human body as a medium of expression. The distinctive Pilobolus approach focuses on how people, working together, can create form and movement with breathtaking effect. In 2012 the company was nominated for a Grammy Award for its interactive music video collaboration with OK Go and Google Chrome Japan, "All is Not Lost." Recently, Pilobolus was honored as the first collective to receive the Dance Magazine Award, which recognizes artists who have made lasting contributions to the field. Who can volunteer? Anyone 18 years of age and up

When do you need volunteers? Saturday March 12th and Monday March 14th through Friday March 18th, from ~ 8 am-10:30 pm depending on the day

Do I need to be available every day that week? No! We are happy to have your help any day you are available.

How many hours will I be volunteering? This number will vary depending on your schedule and where we need help.

How does the class exchange work? For every day (or half day) you volunteer, you will be able to take a day (or half day) of classes for free! So, for example, if you volunteer on Wednesday from 8 am-5 pm, you will be able to take a full day of classes (4 classes!) on Thursday! This is an awesome opportunity!

Is there any training required? You will be required to attend a volunteer orientation on Friday March 11th, Saturday March 12th or Monday March 14th, but this will be coordinated once we have our volunteers in place.

Do you need any special skills? You do not need any special skills to volunteer. However, if you are skilled in areas such as technical theater or technology, please let us know.

Please be aware of the following before signing up: Be sure of your availability before signing up. It is easier to add you in later (we can always use more volunteers) than to schedule you now, only to have your availability change.

Please indicate all of the time you are available that week. I will schedule you accordingly so that half of your available time will be open for taking classes, and half will be volunteering.

Sign up by Friday, February 5th for priority class registration. If you submit your form by Friday, February 5th, you will be sent your volunteering schedule along with a class/conference schedule and registration information at the same time as the participating colleges. You will then be able to sign up for classes at the same time as everyone else. If you submit your form after Friday, February 5th, I cannot guarantee that you will receive your volunteering schedule and the class schedule as quickly, which may mean that you do not get your first choice of classes.

Please note: the class schedule will not be finalized until two weeks prior to the conference. You will be receiving an email from me in several weeks with your volunteer schedule -- please be on the lookout for this as you will be required to respond to confirm your schedule. to teach, launch Ensemble Lab. Liz Lerman — choreographer, author, educator and 2002 MacArthur "Genius Grant" Fellowship recipient — will join the faculty of Arizona State University at the beginning of the spring semester. Widely recognized as an important influence in the worlds of dance, arts-based community engagement and cross-disciplinary collaboration, Lerman will assume a unique position as Institute Professor to lead programs and courses that span disciplines within and beyond ASU's Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts.

"When I arrived at ASU, President Crow challenged me to recruit a leading artist and public intellectual to the Institute. I wanted to bring to ASU someone who has transformed how artists work in the world — whose life's work is a testimony to everything we believe the Herberger Institute stands for — artistry and scholarship that is fully engaged in public life and open to new techniques, new partners and new spaces for creative work. I immediately thought of Liz — perhaps the most creative, generative and generous artist working in America," said Steven J. Tepper, dean of the Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts.

"My appointment here, as much as it's about the art, it's also about the university itself and its interest right now in multidisciplinary practice and its relationship to the community on the whole," said Lerman, citing her enthusiasm for Tepper's vision that design and the arts are critical resources for transforming society at every level. "This is an incredible opportunity to leverage the talent of this great university to advance what has always been for me the intersection of artistic practice for the stage with broader civic purposes."

As a young artist based in Washington, D.C., Lerman (shown in the photo by Lise Metzger) founded the Dance Exchange in 1976. She cultivated its multigenerational ensemble into a leading influence in contemporary dance until 2011, when she began an independent phase of her career, including a recent residency at Harvard University.

Working with collaborators from fields as diverse as genomics, to religion, to physics, her work has won critical and scholarly attention and has included an examination of human-rights law commissioned for the Harvard Law School; a dance about origins launched in the tunnels of the Large Hadron Collider at the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN), and later performed at ASU Gammage; nine short performances about the defense budget; and innovative residencies and collaborations that span nursing homes and medical schools to the National Academy of Sciences and the London Dance Umbrella.

Her Shipyard Project engaged hundreds of local citizens to reflect on the historic and controversial shipyard in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and was one of many community-based endeavors in which she demonstrated the role of art in fostering civic dialogue and promoting social capital.

Recently, Lerman debuted "Healing Wars," a theatrical dance about the role of healers tasked with treating the physical and psychological trauma of war. "You have to ask yourself, 'What makes something good at a children's hospital? What makes it good when it's on stage? What makes it good in whatever environment you're in?'" asked Lerman. "There's permeability between studio art and community art. Sometimes you're in both worlds. That seems to me more true of how life is."

At ASU's Herberger Institute, Lerman will create a cooperative of artists, researchers and civic leaders in a lab-like environment to experiment with methods and techniques for broad social impact. Working across disciplinary lines and schools, her Ensemble Lab will examine the role of artists in society, expand artists' professional opportunities, and prepare artists to be both imaginative innovators and civic partners.

Lerman will integrate her widely recognized Critical Response Process — a four-step system for giving and receiving feedback on artistic works in progress — into "Animating Research," a course she will teach during her inaugural semester. The course will link Herberger Institute students to an array of ASU research projects in ways that will enable artists to refine their personal voice while also translating ideas, statistics and other research into new forms.

"When we think about the role of the artist in society, a central theme of Liz's work at ASU will focus on equity, inclusion and the need to embrace and advance all creative voices in America," Tepper said. "Liz's Ensemble Lab will allow us to experiment and reinvent the 21st-century design

and arts school so that we are tapping into and helping to advance the creativity inherent in our diverse culture and society."

"ASU is giving me a platform to extend my artistic explorations and a chance to work alongside great faculty and students, all of us embarked on the mission of expanding the role of artists in society," Lerman said. "Personal expression matters: It has been the central focus of the arts in the 20th century. But now it's important to take the skills and priorities developed through the arts into the wider world. The Herberger Institute has already embarked on that work. I am excited to be a part of advancing it into the future."

What's It Like to Audition for America's Got Talent?

Doors opened 7 am on Thursday, December 3, 2015, at the Phoenix Convention Center, but lines were able to form at 6 am. Doors closed at 9 pm. Registration was suggested, but not required.

One day last September I received a surprising and unexpected phone call. The person on the other end of the phone

identified himself as an employee of the TV show "America's Got Talent." My first instinct was to wonder who was pranking me, but the call had come from a California area code, so I decided to listen to what he had to say. He explained that they were going to be auditioning in Phoenix for the first time ever and they were looking for performing arts businesses willing to display posters and flyers about the audition. He also asked if Wall-2-Wall Dance Center had any performing groups who might like to audition. I told him that we were an adult tap dance studio and home to the "HeartBeat Tap Ensemble"—a group of tap dancing adults of all ages and walks of life who try to inject comedy into their routines.

HeartBeat Tap Ensemble gets a "fast pass" to America's Got Talent Auditions in Phoenix!

He said that sounded great and hoped that we would come to the audition. I hung up the phone thinking that would probably be the end of it. I'd get the poster and flyers in the mail, and the HeartBeats would decide as a group whether to audition or not.

Fifteen minutes later the phone rang again, and once again the caller ID indicated that the call was coming from California. This time the person on the other end identified himself as an associate producer from "America's Got Talent" and said they checked out my studio website and social media pages and loved what they saw. He wanted

to insure the HeartBeats would come out to the audition, and after several minutes of persuasive conversation, the HeartBeats were auditioning! These auditions were just to determine who would be seen by the celebrity judges at the next round of auditions in a few months. Phone calls followed on a regular basis for background information on our group and we were granted a "fast pass"—no waiting in line to audition.

A week before the audition a different associate producer called who was responsible for setting up what they were

going to film for "color"—backstage at the audition scenes and maybe some interviews at this first round of auditions—and they wanted to include the HeartBeats. With a 7 pm appointment, I was able to get three of our retired members in full costume (bathrobes, wigs or shower caps!) to be at the Phoenix Convention Center in the morning when the doors opened (7 am). I had the cell phone number of a producer to call as soon as we arrived! We were escorted into the audition holding room and told to wait until they could get a technician to mic us. The holding room was a large room filled with chairs, a small dance floor, and lighted

make-up. The room was brightly lit for the television cameras and there were banners and posters all around with the AGT logo. The other acts consisted of singers, dancers, musicians, animal acts, and a guy who was dressed as a statue.

A few minutes later we were asked by Marc Liverman of KTVK-3TV to appear on camera for their morning coverage of the audition. He interviewed me and we performed a little bit of our routine for the cameras. Shortly after we finished, the AGT staff equipped us with wireless mics. We were told to hang out, discuss the competition, the auditions, the celebrity judges, etc. When we were done with that, we were asked to line up with other contestants so that they could film us registering for the auditions. We weren't really registering, just pretending for the cameras. Realty TV is not as "real" as it may seem. At this point only the audition remained.

The HeartBeats gathered at Wall-2-Wall Dance Center (Tempe) that evening and

carpooled to the convention center, checked in and gave the AGT staff member our "Fast Pass." I'm sure we were quite a site—12 adults ranging in age from 22 to 78 in bathrobes and shower caps! We were all issued wristbands and escorted through security to registration. After some paperwork and showing our picture IDs, we were taken to the audition area.

AGT took over the convention center. The audition area was set up with several meeting rooms and chairs in the walkways for those waiting to audition. Each room contained one or more producers who would watch and video tape the performance. We completed even more paperwork, put on our tap shoes, and waited a short time for our producers, while

those without a "Fast Pass" waited several hours! We were the first act ushered into

the room and I gave a short introduction. We performed our 90 second dance (90 seconds is all you are allowed) and we were done! The dance is titled "Saturday Night at the Home" that starts out with the song "You Make Me Feel So Young" and then mixes into "Uptown Funk." The robes come off, and the wigs and shower caps too, during the dance to reveal we are wearing "young" clothes!


