

The 27th Annual State High School Dance Festival held February 25th at Desert Ridge High School in Mesa hosted 34 schools and 633 students.

The Kathy Lindholm Lane Teacher of the Year Award was presented to *Nikki Fox* from Red Mountain High School. It is awarded to dance educators who support and contribute to the larger dance education community, inspire students and colleagues, and advocate for quality dance education and the arts. Nikki graduated from ASU with a BFA in Dance Education and holds a MS from Nova University. She attended ASU on a Regent's Tuition Dance scholarship awarded to her by the ASU Department of Dance each year. Nikki was a member of Honorary University Dance Theatre and President her senior year. She studied with Martha Graham, Murray Louis, Alwin Nikolais, Bill Evans and Daniel Nagrin. She began teaching dance at Westwood in 1984. Red Mountain Dance has been under her direction since 1991.

The **Bill Evans Excellence in Teaching Award** was presented to *Kathy Silk* from Trevor Browne High School. The award recognizes dance educators who exemplify the philosophy and best practices of Bill Evans:

- creating community in the classroom and an environment of trust in which students can experience change and/or transformation
- displaying a developmental sequence of classroom material
- presenting a positive attitude
- engaging students in the learning process and helping them assume responsibility for their growth as an artist and learner
- providing multiple inroads for student understanding, and
- developing in students an appreciation of the relationship between music and dance.

Kathy earned a BA in Dance Education from ASU, and a ME in Human Relations and Counseling from NAU. She has taught at Trevor G. Browne High School for 25 years, where she has written curriculum and participated in Project Masterworks for Phoenix Union High School District. She is an active member of the Arizona dance community and consistently exhibits a dedication and passion for dance and education.

Cody "Coflo" Ferreira, Bay Area Cali native, is a music lover first and dancer second. His love for music drove him to the feel good movement of dance at a very young age. Some 16 years later the feeling and forever growing community continues to keep him moving. Coflo, a student of house dance legend Brian "Footwork" Green, has studied various forms of dance but is most recognized for his footworking based house dance style. Coflo dances with a pioneering crew that calls themselves "The Circle of Fire." He also belongs to an emerging and wide spread artistry collective called "The Soulshifters." Coflo feels dancers should study the subject of music the same way a muscian studies music, after all it is music that the dancers seeks to begin with. He has a strong belief in the essence of freestyle movement/thought within dance. With the core of his foundation being based in New York House Dance, a freestyle dance, he tries to embody a night club feeling no matter the stage he steps on. When teaching Coflo uses a lot of traditional music theory coupled with various philosophies that he has adopted through the years of being exposed to many amazing dancers, musicians and martial artists. Coflo's fundamental take on dance, in any style, is to be prolific. Much like in every day life, to achieve mastery in anything requires more time than most of us have; you must continue to push with positivity and an open mind while developing your craft.

MEMBER SPOTTIGHT'S Alludwig Dance Theatre

Organized in 1977 in California by director Ann Ludwig (right), A Ludwig Dance Theatre moved to Tempe in 1979 and began its ongoing Arizona involvement with creating and community. The New York Times wrote: "Ludwig's pieces careen through a wide assortment of female responses in theatre-dance that has all the ragged, irrational reasonableness of life lived slightly below the polite formalities."



As astute observer of human behavior, Ludwig's work surrounds one with quality of life issues which explore domestic violence, homelessness, women and men's roles in society, drug and alcohol abuse, gender preferences, ravages of war, aging, love, marriage, divorce and Alzheimer's disease, as well as the sheer joy of dancing with flavors from swing, tango, waltz and country. More recent awards, Ann received the Presidents Award from National Dance Education Organization and Arizona Dance Education Organization (2010). Last year (2011) Ludwig received the Governor's Award for Arts in Education presented by The Arizona Commission on the Arts, Alliance for Audience, and the Office of the Governor.

From 1979-2003 Ann taught at Ariziona State University where she is a council member of the Emeritus College. Ann was also a founding director of the Arizona Dance Coalition.

It is the philosophy of A Ludwig Dance Theatre that whether

engaging a room full of first graders or pushing the boundaries for an adult audience, the ease of

performance and the humor of the moment goes a long distance in enticing even the most wary into a conversation with the dance.

It is this sense of considering the unconsidered that has driven a great deal of the thinking of director and choreographer Ann Ludwig. A believer in co-joining all the arts, A Ludwig Dance Theatre has

collaborated with artists, composers, sculptors, symphonies, actors, writers, costume artists, musicians, videographers, dancers of all genres and all ages, performing artists, an attorney and a judge, and a chef! Over the past 35 years, A Ludwig Dance Theatre work has been seen in cities and towns throughout Arizona, across the US and Germany, as well as residencies in 10 cities and villages in Portugal under the sponsorship of the US Embassy in Lisbon.

Are you LinkedIn? I am. And last month I joined a few discussion groups: Teachers of Classical Ballet, Dance Writers, Dance Teachers/Studio Owners and Dance Historians Network. There are a few more groups I want to join, but they may not be active at this time. Here's some background on LinkedIn:

As of February 9, 2012, LinkedIn operates the world's largest professional network on the Internet with more than 150 million members in over 200 countries and territories. Sixty percent of the members are located outside of the US (as of December 31, 2011) and did nearly 4.2 billion professionally-oriented searches on the platform in 2011. Headquartered in Mountain View, CA, it also has US offices in Chicago, LA, NY, Omaha and San Francisco. International LinkedIn offices are located in Amsterdam, Bangalore, Delhi, Dublin, London, Madrid, Melbourne, Milan, Mumbai, Munich, Paris, São Paulo, Singapore, Stockholm, Sydney, Tokyo and Toronto. The company's management team is comprised of seasoned executives from companies like Yahoo!, Google, Microsoft, TiVo, PayPal and Electronic Arts. The CEO of LinkedIn is Jeff Weiner. 31st Annual Governor's Arts Awards by Lisa R. Chow, ADC President

The 31st Annual Governor's Arts Awards was held on Tuesday, March 27 at the Herberger Theater Center in downtown Phoenix. This event is the largest annual statewide gathering of arts and culture supporters in our state. Presented by the Arizona Citizens for the Arts, the Arizona Commission on the Arts and the Office of the Governor, these awards celebrate the extraordinary contributions of artists, arts organizations, businesses, educators and individuals to the quality of life in our state.

The celebration began at 5 pm with a reception featuring a Silent Auction. During the reception, a surprise flashmob lead by *Desert Dance Theatre* and *Step's Junk Funk* directors, *Lisa R. Chow* and *Step Raptis* appeared from opposite street corners in front of the Herberger Theatre Center. It was hard not to notice the flashmobbers when they marched and danced playing syncopated rhythms on Samsonite

suitcases which was part of Step's Junk Funk repertory called "Samsonite." The performers ranged in ages from 16-60+. Later, the flashmob performance continued on stage at 7 pm, preceding the opening speech by Governor Jan Brewer. At the end of the awards ceremony, the evening ended with dessert and music.

The annual presentation is much more than a tradition. The awards reflect three decades of the best in Arizona's arts and culture community and the magnificent contributions they've made to our state's arts and cultural heritage.

Each honoree received a custom-designed award created annually by Arizona artists or an arts organization presented in the Oscar-style award ceremony. (List of winners on the next page.) We are especially proud of the award recipients who made large contributions and strides to the field of dance.







Colleen Jennings-Roggensack was a former dancer and choreographer before her career as an arts administrator and presenter. She has been presenting the performing arts for 33 years and will celebrate her 20th anniversary as Executive Director for ASU Gammage and Assistant Vice President for Cultural Affairs in June. Her leadership and her mission at ASU has been to "Connect Communities" by enabling patrons, artists and the entire community to discover new avenues of intercultural communication through the arts. Under her leadership, the Broadway series has grown into one of the top touring markets in the nation producing an annual economic impact of \$40 million in the Valley. Jennings-Roggensack was nominated by President Clinton and served on the National Council on the Arts from 1994 to 1997. Since 2007, she has served on The Broadway League's Board of Governors and she is Arizona's only Tony Award voter.

Beth Lessard, Ph.D. was the chair of the ASU Dance Department from 1977 to 1993 and professor until her retirement in 1999. Dr. Lessard elevated the dual degree path for dancers interested in both teaching and creating and performing dance. Under her guidance, the Arizona Dance Education Organization was formed to provide resources, scholarships and educational support for Arizona teachers and schools to provide quality dance curriculum. She also established the artist-inresidence program at ASU to bring national dance artists and companies to Tempe to teach, collaborate and perform with students and faculty.
