



ADC Lifetime Achievement Award (LAA)Nominations

May 22, 2010, ADC presented its first LAA to *Frank Trent* at the 2nd annual **National TAP Dance Day Celebration** in Tucson, of which ADC is a co-sponsor. Trent began performing at the age of 4 with his Vaudvillian parents, had a long professional career as a tap dancer *(opened for Elvis' touring show for almost 10 years)* and opened a dance studio in Tucson some 30 years ago ~ **Danswest**. He continues to produces exceptional tap dancers even in semi-retirement, choreographs for the senior tap dance group **Tap Sensation**, and recently started his first tap dance company **TAP ATTACK**. Trent is a Tucson treasure and ADC is proud to have him be our first LAA recipient.

Nominations are being accepted for 2011 and a fill-in PDF form will be emailed to ADC members. We look to our membership to nominate dance artists who have made significant contributions to dance arts in Arizona. **Deadline for nominations is March 31.**

Regional & ADC Festival News

Northern Arizona

ADC will join **Canyon Movement Company** and **Human Nature Dance Theater** to cohost the second annual **Flagstaff Performing Arts Fringe Festival** in mid-May. Master classes and performances will grace the northern Arizona dance scene with companies from around the west. More information will be forthcoming in future issues.

Canyon Movement Company premiered it's show *Dusk to Dawn - Vampire Legends* to enthusiastic sold-out crowds in October and plans to make it an annual event. Their 7th annual *Nutcracker Suite in Modern Bare Feet* had a cast and crew of 80 dancers and community members and included three lecture-demonstrations for local schools.

Central Arizona

ADC is holding their annual all-member meeting this Saturday, January 8, 4:30-6:30 pm, at Dance Theater West, Phoenix (see Calendar of Events). Members and non-members are invited to attend and learn about the state of arts in Arizona from our guest speaker, Bob Booker, Executive Director of the Arizona Commission on the Arts.

AzDEO was a co-host for the 2010 NDEO Conference in October held in Tempe. 450 attended from 44 states and 4 countries. 80 were from Arizona. Contributing to the conference, ADC awarded two scholarships to high school students to attend the Bill Evans Workshop: *Geraldine Arrieta* and *Nick Rivera*, both seniors at Maryvale High School. NDEO Presidential Citations were given to *Lynn Tuttle*, ADC board member *Ann Ludwig* and the *Arizona Commission on the Arts*.

Southern Arizona

Tap dancing continues to flourish in Tucson. Our first **TAP IMPROV 101** workshop was a success thanks to panelists *Chrissy Jones* and *Megan Maltos*. *Chip Ritter*, drummer, provided a musician's view point on how to begin *improvisation* training. We thank *UApresents* for promoting the event at *Savion Glover's* performance and **Tap Sensation** for providing their studio for the event. *Suzy Guarino* (Phoenix) and *Jimmy Tate* (Broadway) held a tap workshop at **Danswest Dance Studio** on December 27 that included a session on *improvisation*. A few more *improv* workshops will be conducted before we make a formal presentation at the end of our master tap dance classes at the 3rd annual **National TAP Dance Day Celebration** May 22 on Sunday afternoon. The event will be free to the public and will include performances by master class participants from across Arizona. ADVOCACY FOR DANCE

any times throughout our dance careers we are faced with educating not only students, but their parents, our friends and colleagues, administrators, business and community leaders and government officials on the benefits of dancing. *Lynn Monson*, past president of the **Arizona Dance Education Organization**, put together a series of bullet points promoting these benefits and is sharing them with us so we can become better advocates for Dance.

- The study of Dance requires discipline, perseverance, creative thinking, problem solving and higher order thinking to learn and master the range of concepts, skills, and knowledge that define the discipline of Dance.
- Dance engages the body and the mind.
- Dance is academic. Students must practice on a regular basis, learn and master higher order thinking skills (apply, evaluate and create).
 - Students must understand the basic elements of movement and dance, including how to use the body safely and efficiently.
 - Students must understand and master technique in many different styles and forms. This means they must understand the concepts that define those varying techniques and then translate (apply) that into their body. Not an easy task for most and takes a great deal of practice.
 - Students must memorize long sequences of movement and full dances, and then perform them in front of an audience.
 - Students must understand the principles and techniques of creating choreography (dance) and then apply that in creating their own choreography. Students are practicing and learning the highest skill level according to Bloom's Taxonomy.
 - Students must analyze, critique, and evaluate dance to understand its history, its communicative power, its cultural influence, and its many functions.
- Kinesthetic learning is one of the multiple intelligences. Dance falls under kinesthetic learning, and as such, is validated as a recognized and powerful avenue for learning.
- There are both National Academic Standards and State Academic Standards for Dance.
- Dance, as one of the art forms, is included as a core subject under No Child Left Behind (NCLB).
- The U.S Department of Education recognizes Dance as an art form through its funding stream for schools.
- Universities offer undergraduate, graduate and PhD degrees in Dance (under fine arts). Dance has been a discipline represented by universities dating back to the 1920s.
- "Academic" is defined by the dictionary as "relating to studies that are liberal or classical rather than technical or vocational." "Dance" falls under "classical." In addition, "Academician" is defined as "a member of an art, literary or scientific academy or society." The dictionary places the arts, including Dance, under the preview of "academic."

About the Author

Lynn Monson contributed to the Performance Objectives for the Arizona Dance Standards in 1997 and the revised Arizona Dance Standards in 2005-06. She is a member of the Dance Notation Bureau, International Council of Kinetography Laban, National Dance Education Organization, a board member of the Arizona Alliance for Arts Education and served on the board of the Arizona Dance Arts Alliance. Lynn was instrumental in the formation of the AzDEO (ADC member), was secretary and president, and now and serves as secretary on the charter board.

COSTUME TIP by Marlina Kessler

A mix of 1 tsp liquid fabric softner in a cup of water works great as an **anti-static** and **wrinkle** spray. Mix solution and put in a spray bottle, shake before use. Mix will last for about 2 weeks. ALWAYS

test on inconspicuous area first to see if mixture spots. Different fabrics and softner brands react differently. I have had great success with Downey.

SOMA TIP

Relevés & elevés promote venous blood flow towards the heart.



It takes one heartbeat to pump the oxygen rich blood from the heart to the lower leg. However, it requires several strong heartbeats to force the blood back up to the heart. When the calves are active, they work as the body's secondary heart and help propel the blood back to the heart.

This is called the "calf pump."
