





# Are we using the right terms?

I recently read an article **Don't Support**the Arts by *Peter Hemminger* (Feb 5, **The**Consumption). He writes, "*The words we use*are important." His title got my attention
because I can't imagine anyone not supporting
the arts. But it is the choice of the word
"support" he is questioning and the "vague and
intimidating" use of the phrase "the arts."

Dancers are a part of "the arts" community that research has shown brings in millions of dollars to the Arizona economy. In the October 2012 Arizona Dance e-Star's issue, Ricardo

**Bedoya**, Executive Director of the **Tucson Pima Arts Council**, wrote that \$87.7 million
in revenue was made in the nonprofit arts
sector. Is it The Nutcrackers? Or is it the Arts,
Music and Dance Festivals, Street Fairs, sculptors,
painters, poets, musicals, plays, operas, symphony
and dance concerts?

I'd like to know where "we" (dancers) fit in "the arts" in AZ and what our contribution is to our economy. What percentage of that revenue can be attributed to work we perform on behalf of dance? And are those in dance-related jobs

benefiting from it or is it going to someone else? You can help us determine that percentage by becoming an ADC subscriber (*free*) and enlisting others to subscribe as well. Learn how your subscription will help our research specific to the dance community in AZ on the next page. (ADC members are automatically subscribers.)

Back to "support" and what it is we really want to say. Hemminger lists better verbs we could be using ~ Making art. Discussing art. Attending. Enjoying. Thinking about. Engaging with. Watching. Listening. "Recognizing the art we walk by every day."

He goes on to write, "The whole reason we talk about supporting the arts is that artistic

experiences *enrich* people's lives; they *broaden* perspectives, provide *entertainment* and social *interactions*. That's what gets us excited about art. That's why we put so much time into making sure that arts experiences happen—all those great *verbs*."

When we ask people to "support" dance (your event, company or school), are we asking them to perform a chore, a duty, an obligation? Do we imply we are weak, exhausted (if they only knew), and about to collapse? Are we broke? (See the last page. The Wallace Foundation may be able to help you with financial issues.) As Hemminger puts it (support), "It's not going to be fun, but it'll make you a better person."

What we really want is for people to be involved in "our" arts, and not define ourselves as a charity looking for handouts so we can exist in our own world.

All this being said, one person commented on Hemminger's article writing that sometimes the use of "*support*" is appropriate—when it is a very intimate and connected thing, i.e., support your candidate, policy, mission/cause, your spouse, your children, etc. It has deep and personal meaning and is *not* an obligation.

Hemminger puts it best, "We want people to

have their *minds blown* and their *world views shaking*; we want them to have the kinds of experiences that only art can provide." And this is what artists *are* trying to do and have done. They are just frustrated at times. Let's start using exciting and passion-generating words when we promote ourselves, our organizations, our community and our "art."


