Krystyna Parafinczuk lives in Tucson and is one of the original board members of the Arizona Dance Coalition representing the Southern Arizona dance community. Having a business background in public relations, finance and insurance, she acts as ADC's treasurer, grant writer, editor/designer of the Arizona Dance e-Star and organizer/producer of the National TAP Dance Day Celebration (NTDD). Krystyna has more than 30 years experience in dance production, choreography, education and performance. Born and trained in Chicago, she has studied with: Evelyn Lare, Larry Long and the faculty of Ruth Page S/D, Ellis-Duboulay, Lou Conte S/D, Giordano S/D, Innesse Alexandrov and Barbara Dubosq (ballet). In 1990 she put her business background and dance training to work and started DancInc, a dance studio in Northfield, Illinois - a North Shore suburb. In 2002, Krystyna brought herself and DancInc to Tucson to research, write, teach, produce and promote dance on a larger scale. There is much to be said for a sunny environment that produces Vitamin D and Dancers!

The NTDD Celebration began in 2009 upon the insistence of Colleen "Kelly" Beaman. She rallied the Irish and Krystyna enlisted the help of the Arizona Dance Coalition (e-Blasts), her Phoenix contact, Nian Cadman-Dake (2011 Honored Guest), and Tucson's tap master Frank Trent (2010 ADC Lifetime Achievement Award winner). With the help of the Tucson tap dance community and *Tap 24.7* (Phoenix), the NTDD Celebration was born.

How Copyrightable Ballets Began with Balanchine

George Balanchine, a Russian émigré, was the first U.S. choreographer to acquire copyright protection for his choreographic works through his will and eventually, it was through his estate that the first copyright infringement claim occurred. Balanchine created the "standard look" of the hyper-whitened, ethereally slim ballerina, and with that, the history of copyrightable American modern dance choreography began. Balanchine created a will bequeathing his ballets as property because [he] found out that upon his death without a will, his sole heir would be his brother who lived in Georgia, in the Soviet Union. Appalled, Balanchine was determined not to let all of his possessions go, not to his brother, but the Communist government, whom he suspected would claim everything. Eventually, Balanchine's ballets, inclusive of its look of hyperwhitened, impossibly thin feminine beauty, became delimited from the public sphere as private property. The ability to control not only performances of the ballets, but also their "look" or representation, now passed into the hands of Balanchine's principal legatees. [His] heirs had to be vigilant that their newly acquired rights would not be violated. One such protective action, a landmark copyright infringement case, Horgan v. McMillan, left absolute control of photographic materials of Balanchine's ballets in the hands of Balanchine's estate. Such dominance of control over choreography is true, principally of Balanchine's estate; crucial to establishing such control was Balanchine's possession of whiteness as status property.
