Pilobolus engages and inspires audiences around the world using diverse collaborations that break down barriers between disciplines and challenge the understanding of dance. The original company, Pilobolus Dance Theater, has been touring its 115 pieces of repertory to more than 64 countries during the past four decades. Named after a barnyard fungus that propels its spores with extraordinary speed, accuracy and strength, Pilobolus was founded in 1971 by a group of Dartmouth College students and quickly became renowned the world over for its witty and gravity-defying works using the human body as a medium of expression. The distinctive Pilobolus approach focuses on how people, working together, can create form and movement with breathtaking effect. In 2012 the company was nominated for a Grammy Award for its interactive music video collaboration with OK Go and Google Chrome Japan, "All is Not Lost." Recently, Pilobolus was honored as the first collective to receive the Dance Magazine Award, which recognizes artists who have made lasting contributions to the field. "There are other companies that take art to extremes, but Pilobolus proves once more that it does it best." – Philadelphia Inquirer

Dance presents its spring, biannual No Frills Dance


Happenin'. A variety of performers throughout

they will be conducting residency activities on and off campus. During Camille's time here, she is interested in working with dancers and non-dancers leading workshops that assist in people finding their individual story through social dance and dialogue around, race, gender and history. As part of ASU Gammage BEYOND series, we work to connect our visiting artists to the surrounding community through such workshops, lectures and conversations.

BLACK GIRL- Linguistic Play. This performance depicts the complexities of carving out a positive identity as a Black female in urban American culture. Come and join us for a rare opportunity to explore African American social dances, from authentic jazz to hip-hop. This program began at Jacob's Pillow in July 2015.

Fluency on the dance floor includes learning the aesthetic values and political histories embedded in the social dances. We will examine the multiple influences and identities that remain embodied in dances of today.



Camille A. Brown is a prolific choreographer who has achieved multiple accolades and awards for her daring works. From 2001-2007, Ms. Brown was a member of Ronald K. Brown's Evidence, A Dance Company, and was a guest artist with Rennie Harris' Puremovement, and Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater (2008 and 2011). She has commissioned works for Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Philadanco!, Urban Bush Women, Complexions, Ailey II, Ballet Memphis, and Hubbard Street II, among others.



Ed Flores, Tucson's premiere dance photographer, discusses his photo shoot experience with ADC member Haley Johnson:

Working with Haley was so much fun and for me, inspiring. I love the way she moves as there is such a smooth, beautiful and elegant way she dances. There wasn't a shortage of images that we could have created during our time together. I am humbled to have worked with Haley and that she asked me to create with her. It was more than I could have asked for. Thank you, Haley. I am one of your biggest fans.

Haley Johnson, from Libertyville, Illinois, a suburb north of Chicago, is currently a sophomore at the University of Arizona pursuing her Bachelors of Fine Arts as a dance major. She studies ballet, jazz, modern and contemporary techniques and wishes to pursue a professional career as a concert dancer for her dream company—Nederlands Dans Theater.

Prior to college, she trained at the Joffrey Ballet Academy in Chicago under the artistic directors Anna Reznik and Alexei Kremnev. She also trained in summer intensives since she was in seventh grade with these schools/companies: Orlando Ballet, Houston Ballet, Gelsey Kirkland Academy of Dance, Alonzo King LINES Ballet, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, and Nederlands Dans Theater.

UA Dance dance highlights include being a principal dancer for Jerome Robbin's Antique Epigraphs, soloist for Melissa Lowe's Invisible Sun, soloist in James Clouser's At the Vanguard, and more. This semester Haley is creating a contemporary work performed by four women and four men under the music composition of Ezio Bosso to be auditioned for the 2016 Spring Student Spotlight performance.

Haley's comments on working with Ed Flores:

The experience was a remarkable collaboration. The process was unique in such a way where he inspired me by simply giving me freedom to improvise movement. From there we both found inspiration with the movement. Ed's genius eye for essence and aesthetic moved me as an artist and I plan to continue with multiple collaborations in the future.







MEET AMBER ROBINS

Center Dance Ensemble (CDE) is presenting Daughters of Eve this month (pg 3, March 3-6). It is a performance looking at the many facets of women: supportive, aggressive, nurturing, independent. One of those women worth looking at is CDE's dancer Amber Robins. Here's an introduction by CDE director Frances Smith Cohen, and Amber herself, telling you a little bit about her life, loves and future direction.



"My joy and muse is Amber Robins," states Cohen. "For this upcoming concert (March 3-6, Herberger, pg 3) she is

dancing Anne (pictured above), the lead in The Attic based on The Diary of Anne Frank, and also has a major role in my new work A Love Story. She started with the company 16 years ago." Cohen continues to marvel, "She is the true picture of a modern dancer (in her prime) here in Phoenix. With her work with CDE, and working with other choreographers, teaching in private studios as well as running her own adult classes, Kaleidoscape, and being a mother and a wife, she is now expanding into her own choreography."

And now, meet Amber: I am a native of Arizona and received all of my dance training here. I started with ballet at age of five and I loved the classical music as well as getting to pretend to be a butterfly. [Didn't we all?] At the same time I had a huge love of musical theater and started with community theater at age eight. I went to Glendale Community College (GCC) and helped the new Dance Chair start the first dance company. Hard work opened my eyes to the world of modern dance. I still loved



the structure of ballet, its beauty, and music. Most of all I loved ballet for its harmony of line. However, modern dance allowed me to blend my love of dance and theater a little more. With classical ballet, emotions are felt but many times they are shown through specific gestures. Where with modern, we are typically given the freedom to pull from our own experiences and bring them into the dance. It was said in a dance forum I attended that "modern is the humanity of movement." This phrase has stayed with me for years and is instrumental in my recent choreography.

So, after GCC, I auditioned and received one of two scholarships awarded to in-state students to attend the ASU Dance program. I graduated with my BA and ended up dancing with a few modern companies in Phoenix before moving to Georgia and dancing with Ballet South. I was given soloist roles and enjoyed learning how a ballet company worked. After a year I yearned for home and I moved back to Phoenix. I auditioned for Center Dance Ensemble and was hired as a full company member. It was here with Fran Cohen that I was able to grow and learn in my dancing, performing, and discover my artistic voice.



Fran has trusted me with so many wonderful roles and challenges -- the iconic role of Anne Frank in "The Attic", the wailing woman in "La Llorona," and the Snow Queen in "Snow Queen." She has asked me to take these opportunities and create believable characters that tell her story in a truly authentic way through the use of her choreography. Here is where I feel like an artist. Interpreting a message through the use of my body (my instrument) and involving the audience in a way that they care about what they are watching, and as a result, feeling as if they are being included. It is important for me not to just dance and have people sit back and watch, but to create a complete environment that the audience can

experience. Fran has inspired me to be the best dancer I can be. She holds a special place in my heart

During that time I have taught in many places and branched out dancing my own, as well as in other people's works in Chicago, Santa Monica, Temecula, and Las Vegas in various dance festivals. It is a dream of mine to get my own choreographic voice heard. I am starting to submit for festivals and choreographic competitions more and more. I am seizing any and all opportunities I can find. Meanwhile, I am also teaching adults at Dance Theater West and



children at Leap of Faith. Both studios are great. I am a much better dancer when I teach. I learn so much from working with such a broad range of ages. My oldest student just turned 89 and my youngest is nine. There is nothing like watching older students dance with grace and maturity and then watching young people dance with insane energy and so much potential. I love all of them and feel so lucky to have these classes and students to share our common love of dancing.



So somewhere in between dancing and teaching, {ha ha}, I met my wonderful husband of 14 years. He had two young daughters that we raised together, and also had a son of our own. The girls are all grown up now, and our son attends a Phoenix Arts High School studying drawing and film design. Yes, he is an artist and has dreams of creating video games for a living. My husband is a glass, wood, and now ceramics artist, so our kid didn't stand a chance. :) And somehow in the mix of all this we have three fish, two big dogs, and three cats. Our house is NOT boring or quiet. We bought our dream home a year ago

and have been tearing out all the flooring, painting, dry walling, etc. We love working on

the house and are making it ours.
As I write, we gutted the bathroom and are actually installing a new bathtub this weekend. Hurray!!! It will be nice to have that bathroom back.

And that's my story!





TIP for Strengthening Ballet/Ballroom Arms

I'm fortunate to teach in two facilities that hold fitness equipment. One of those had weighted bars and I was inspired. I saw the bars and went "ah ha!" I took a picture of my students holding three pound bars just above their wrists, with their arms in a practice hold, similar to ballet's 2nd position. We traveled

the length of the room doing a progressive half-box pattern, forward and backward, and definitely felt the bars working to make our arms stronger in a position that was important for dancing.

If you don't have weighted bars, consider using a rod strong enough to hold grocery bags (or similar) at either end weighted with objects, i.e., small cans of tomato paste or diced green chillies to large cans of food or heavy shoes or even hand weights. Just don't use anything like bags of jelly beans in case the bag drops and breaks!

Google "body bars" and you will find an assortment of brands and weights.


