



Trisha Brown, Choreographer and Pillar of American Postmodern Dance, Dies at 80

Trisha Brown, the choreographer and exemplar of the founding generation of American postmodern dance, died on Saturday (March 18, 2017) in San Antonio. She was 80. Few dance inventors have so combined the cerebral and sensuous sides of dance as Ms. Brown did, and few have been as influential. Her choreography, showcased primarily in New York, helped shape generations of modern dance creators into the 21st century. ... She had been an international figure for over 30 years, choreographing for the Paris Opera Ballet, collaborating with Mikhail Baryshnikov, and commissioning stage designs from Robert Rauschenberg and other eminent visual artists, including Donald Judd and Nancy Graves. ... In 1988, the French government named Ms. Brown Chevalier dans l'Ordre des Arts et Lettres. In January 2000 she was promoted to Officier and in 2004 to Commandeur. In 1991, she was named a MacArthur fellow, the first female choreographer to achieve this distinction. ... Ms. Brown, a gently but memorably witty woman, simply described her own idiom as "the line of least resistance," neatly evoking the rippling chain-effect of throughthe-body impulses and ricochets that characterized much of her dance. ... When, in 1989, Mr. Baryshnikov turned from being a ballet specialist to a master investigator of American modern dance, Ms. Brown was a favorite collaborator. That solo in 1995 became a duet, "You Can See Us." As danced in 1996, this showed Mr. Baryshnikov facing front; Ms. Brown still kept her back to the audience. ... Ms. Brown, a gently but memorably witty woman, simply described her own idiom as "the line of least resistance," neatly evoking the rippling chaineffect of through-the-body impulses and ricochets that characterized much of her dance.

Founded in 1988, it continues the work of the National Association for Regional Ballet which contributed to the decentralization of dance. As regional companies grew in stature and quality, the five regional organizations were established, the Mid-States, the Northeast, the Pacific, the Southeast, and the Southwest. Regional Dance America has and will continue to dedicate itself to fostering quality, promoting education and nurturing the talents of dancers and choreographers throughout the country while exploring new horizons.

Kizomba

is originally from *Angola, Africa* and describes both a genre of music and a dance. The word "Kizomba" means "party" in Kimbundo, a spoken language in Angola. The term "Kizombadas" was first referred to as large neighborhood parties between friends and family in the '60s, however the music genre as we know it today was born in the '80s. Kizomba has its roots from Semba, Masemba, which started in the '50s and '60s. During the '80s the dance was heavily influenced by the Caribbean Zouk and took shape as a Kizomba. Other music and dance genre that influenced Kizomba are Coladeira and Passada from the Cape Verde Islands. Today, there are several styles of Kizomba, Original/traditional Kizomba, Urban/ Modern Kizomba and other sub-categories such as Tarraxinha, Quadradriha, Ventoninha and more new style are being created.

Kizomba requires great leading and following skills and enables dancers to connect on a much deeper level and play with the music as much as they want to. The dance is becoming more and fused with other forms of dances to create more innovative moves, patterns and combinations. Kizomba is one of the fastest growing dance communities in the world and brings people from all backgrounds of life together to have fun and dance again and again.

Kizomba is known for having a slow, insistent, somewhat harsh yet sensuous rhythm as the result of electronic percussion. It is danced accompanied by a partner, very smoothly, slowly and sensuously, and with neither tightness nor rigidity. There are frequent simultaneous hip rotations coordinated between dance partners, particularly in the quieter refrains of the music. (wikipedia)






How Miscommunication Happens (and how to avoid it)


Recently I viewed this great animated presentation on YouTube on Communication, or rather "miscommunication." Mercury is turning retrograde soon, so I thought I'd share at least these four points for "sharing" a



dialogue, from this clip by Katherine Hampsten:

- Recognize that passive hearing and active listening are not the same. Engage
 actively with the verbal and non-verbal feedback of others and adjust your
 message to facilitate greater understanding.
- Listen with your eyes and ears, as well as with your gut. Remember that communication is more than just words.
- Take time to understand as you try to be understood. In the rush to express ourselves it's easy to forget communication is a two-way street. Be open to what the other person might say.
- Be aware of your personal perceptual filters. Elements of your experience, including your culture, community and family, influence how you see the world. Say, "This is how I see the problem. How do you see it?" Don't assume that your perception is the objective truth. That will work towards sharing a dialogue with others to reach a common understanding together.


